## Post-Graduation Work Permit (PGWP) List of Additional Documents

What supporting documents do I need?

Merge all documents into one file and upload to the "client information" section under "optional documents."

## Tips on writing a letter of explanation

A letter of explanation allows you to speak directly to the immigration officer and provide additional context not otherwise found in your application. Your letter, along with your supporting documentation, is extremely important and may determine whether your PGWP application is approved.

Think of this as a good opportunity to practice writing a professional Canadian-style business letter. It should be respectful, honest, clear, and concise – no longer than one page. Focus on the facts of your situation and avoid overly emotional language. See our template here: <a href="https://tinyurl.com/UBClettertemplate">https://tinyurl.com/UBClettertemplate</a>.

Your letter should contain the following:

1. A stated purpose based on your situation:

- 2. A thorough **timeline** containing exact dates (e.g. start and end date of a gap in studies)
- 3. A summary of additional supporting documents included in your application

If asking for a PGWP despite not meeting eligibility requirements, consider also adding:

- 4. An **outline of actions taken**. For example, did you:
  - a. Consistently meet the conditions of your study permit?
  - b. Act responsibility?
  - c. Seek advice from trusted sources, such as International Student Advising?
  - d. Acknowledge mistakes (if applicable)?
  - e. Cease working when required (if applicable)?
- 5. Your **character**. For example:
  - a. How did you contribute positively to Canada (such as your community, your school) during your studies?
  - b. How will you contribute positively to Canada if given the PGWP?
- 6. The **importance of the PGWP** to your future aspirations career and otherwise
